The purpose of providing a public education is to benefit not just the individual receiving it, but also the public at large.

The South Carolina Constitution mandates:

"The General Assembly shall provide for the maintenance and support of a system of free public schools open to all children in the state."

S.C. Constitution Act XI, §3

We hold today that the South Carolina Constitution's education clause requires the General Assembly to provide the opportunity for each child to receive a minimally adequate education. (emphasis added)

We define this minimally adequate education required by our Constitution to include providing students adequate and safe facilities in which they have the opportunity to acquire:

- the ability to read, write and speak the English language, and knowledge of mathematics and physical science;
- a fundamental knowledge of economic, social, and political systems, and a history of governmental processes; and
- academic and vocational skills.

Abbeville provides a template:

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"The provisions of the Constitution shall be ... construed to be mandatory." Second, "since the education clause uses the term 'shall," it is mandatory."
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Key Idea: The General Assembly must provide South Carolina's children educational opportunities.




Comparison of Test Data By Percentile
















Comparison of Test Data By Percentile




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
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


% of Teachers on Continuing Contracts


Success for *Every* Student in the 21st Century Workplace

- 1) While only 32 percent of our ninth graders will pursue a two-year degree or certification, the majority of jobs-65 percent- will require one;
- 2) Another 28 percent of our ninth graders will pursue a four-year degree, yet only 20 percent of jobs will require one; and
- 3) The final 40 percent of our ninth graders will pursue an "unskilled" job-because they either drop out of high school or simply lack the skills needed for employment-but only 15 percent of jobs available will be considered "unskilled."

These figures reflect an enormous mismatch of education and workplace needs that our state simply cannot afford, a gap that is growing daily.








Percentage of Schools Unsatisfactory and Below Average State vs. Plaintiff Districts, 2003



Percentage Schools in Plaintiff Districts Rated Unsatisfactory or Below Average 2001 to 2003








Mayfield Report to the South Carolina House and Senate, 1897

Brown v. Board of Education 347 U.S. 483 (1954)
